Speaker Biographies

Admiral Lord West, Former Under Secretary of State for Security and now Chancellor of Southampton Solent University



Lord West has had a distinguished naval career, serving as head of Naval Intelligence and Chief of Defence Intelligence as well as being First Sea Lord for the invasion of Iraq and Commander in-Chief Fleet for the invasion of Afghanistan. He has advised both Conservatives and Labour on defence and foreign policy and in 2007 became the Minister responsible for national security and counter-terrorism as well as cyber security. He left government in 2010 and is the current Chancellor of Southampton Solent University.

Clifford Chanin, Senior Vice President for Education and Public Programs of the 9/11 Memorial & Museum



Clifford manages the US National September 11 Museum's education, interpretive, scholarly, publishing and public programs. For the Museum, Chanin co-edited The Stories They Tell: Artifacts from the National September 11 Memorial and curated the Museum's fifth and tenth commemoration exhibitions. Chanin produced two films, Facing Crisis: America Under Attack and Facing Crisis: A Changed World, based on interviews he conducted with key 9/11 decision-makers.

Sara Khan, Co-Director of Inspire



Sara Khan is an award winning British Muslim human rights activist and codirector of Inspire, a counter-extremism and women's rights organisation which she co-founded. Author of 'The Battle for British Islam', Sara is also a regular contributor to various newspapers and has made numerous appearances on British television and radio.

Fiyaz Mughal OBE, Founder of Tell MAMA and Faith Matters



Fiyaz is the founder and Director of both TELL MAMA, the acclaimed anti-Muslim hate crime monitoring project and Faith Matters, which focuses on social cohesion and integration. Well respected as an authority on extremism in communities, he has served as an advisor to Nick Clegg on preventing radicalisation as well as numerous other advisory roles for local authorities and government

Hanif Qadir, Counter-Terrorism Strategist, Founder of Active Change Foundation



A former extremist, Hanif once joined Al-Qaeda members in Afghanistan but was deterred by the crimes committed against civilians. He returned to the UK and vowed to safeguard others from similar experiences; the Active Change Foundation does exactly this. He has assisted policy makers in reforming key aspects of the *Preventing Violent Extremism* Report and otherwise works with UK police forces and other government institutions as well as research academics across the globe.

Ziauddin Yousafzai



Ziauddin is Malala's father and co-founded the Malala Fund with his daughter and their close family friend Shiza Shahid. In Pakistan, Ziauddin was an educator, running several schools. He is well-known for his outspoken support for girls' rights to education, equality and human rights. Ziauddin is U.N. Special Adviser on Global Education and Education Attaché at Pakistan's Consulate in Birmingham, UK.

Nicky Napier



Nicky Napier was living in New Jersey with her husband, Alex and their three young children, when the World Trade Center was attacked. Alex, who worked at the top of 2WTC, lost his life that day. Nicky worked as a primary teacher prior to moving to the US and had since worked in a Sure Start centre and currently works as a volunteer, supporting struggling families with preschool children through the charity, 'Home-Start'.

Val McGregor, MBE, Education Adviser for Free Schools and Academies and Ann Connor, Education Adviser

More recently, her roles include Lead Adviser for Tuition at DfE and now she is an Education Adviser for Free Schools and Academies. Simon Schama CBE, University Professor of Art History and History at Columbia University and a Contributing Editor of the Financial Times



Simon is the author of seventeen books and the writer-presenter of fifty documentaries on art, history and literature for BBC2. Awards for his work include an Emmy, the NCR non-fiction prize, the National Book Critics Guild award and the WH Smith Literary Award, among others. He curated the Government Art Collection show *Travelling Light* and has collaborated on several other contemporary art exhibitions and installations. He is currently working on Civilisations, a television history of world art.

Tim Marlow, Art Historian and Broadcaster



Tim Marlow joined the Royal Academy of Arts in 2014 as Artistic Director, prior to this role he was Director of Exhibitions at White Cube (2003-2014).
